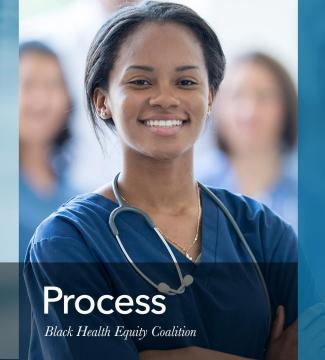




Distribution of resources to benefit Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC), and lower-income white populations have oppressive structures of power and authority of decision making, rooted in cultural and racial racism. A new, equitable solution is needed, led by community members with lived experiences or context experts, advocates donors/funders, businesses, public and agents/agencies through a supporting organization to address Black, African, and African American communities who face significant health disparities due to inequities of the social determinants of health.



- System-building among community-driven organizations in support of collective investment and impact
- Capacity-building of BIPOC-focused organizations who are at risk of facing catastrophic organizational impact or closure without support
- A solution platform or program co-designed to remove oppressive practices within philanthropic distribution and building the capacity to provide culturally appropriate, equity-oriented impact
- Reduce barriers challenging youth and families most impacted by inequitable economic conditions caused by COVID and other social determinants of health



- Respond to King County communities' needs for youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility targeting Black and African American communities
- Solicit donors, sponsors, and corporations to support a collective effort to benefit county-wide resources and program development that reduce health disparities
- Unite mission-driven organizations working to build anti-racist and equity-driven impact in Black, African, and African American communities
- YMCA of Greater Seattle and the Urban League of Metropolitan Seattle convene funders, manage funding process, coordinate mutually benefitting activities, communicate impact, manage common agenda, and share process

Backbone Organizations

The **Backbone Organizations** in a collective impact effort will maintain overall strategic coherence and manage the day-to-day operations and implementation of work including (but not limted to) stakeholder engagement, communications, data collection and analysis, and other responsibilities. The YMCA of Greater Seattle and Urban League of Metropolitan Seattle will serve as co-backbone organizations.









- Guide Vision & Strategy Partners are encouraged to share a common understanding of the need and desired result to align individual work with the group's common agenda
- Support Aligned Activities
 Coordinate activities toward common goals while working collaboratively to develop new approaches
- Establish Shared Measurement Practices
 Use data to adapt and refine strategies
- Build Public Will
 Bring awareness to health disparities and empower the community to take action
- Advance Policy
 Encourage policymakers to enact policy changes that align with coalition goals
- Mobilize Funding
 Support activities and encourage philanthropic and public funds to increasingly focus on coalition goals

Overall Work Group Goal

A new health and social services directory and referral system is needed to guide Black, African, and African American communities in securing resources, knowledge, and services addressing the social determinants of health. This directory would be culturally appropriate and inclusive of language differences in the Puget Sound region to provide equitable access to health and social support that remove barriers of access and is culturally welcoming to



Work Group Objectives

- Design a coalition of partnerships focused on Black Health Equity with hopes of sustaining beyond pilot phase.
- Identify health, social welfare, and education practitioners with lived experiences and/or trained in culturally appropriate practices most specific to Black, African, and African American communities.
- Develop and produce a directory of health and social service providers and agencies in the Puget Sound region inclusive of medical, nutrition, health & wellness, and family and children services.
- Provide a multicultural and multilingual directory.



Actions

- Backbone organizations will seek funding to staff and support the production of a public directory to be published with a target goal of December 2023.
 Additional funding beyond 2023 to be secured by Backbone organizations and coalition partners as needed.
- All coalition partners have stake in future actions and measures of success.

Black Health Inequities

- WA state does not have dedicated culturally-focused programs and interventions addressing lifespan health inequities in Black communities.
- COVID has uncovered the generational health inequities among those who are most economically impacted and dying at disproportionate rates from this crisis.
- Black, African, and African American communities are most likely to be uninsured, less likely to have access to sick leave, less likely to receive COVID testing, and less than 20% have the ability to work remotely.
- Black, African, and African American unemployment is rising while white unemployment begins to rebound post-COVID, expanding economic inequality.
- An estimated 40% of Black-owned businesses will not survive the crisis, compared to 17% of white businesses.

Statistics continued...

- If Black, African and African American and white populations had the same mortality rate, there would be 83,000 less Black deaths per year.
- Black, African and African American women are 3-4 times more likely to die from pregnancy-related causes than white women.
- Black, African and African American children have a 500% higher death rate from asthma than white children.
- Black, African and African American children drown at 5.5 times the rate of other children.
- Black, African and African American adults are more likely to die from lung, prostate, and breast cancer than white adults.
- Black, African and African American children under the age of 13 are twice as likely to die by suicide than white children.





Statistics continued...

- Washington State population of Black, African and African American people make up 259,482 - or 3.6% of the total population.
- Black, African and African American Life Expectancy is 77.1 Years compared to 82 for white King County communities.

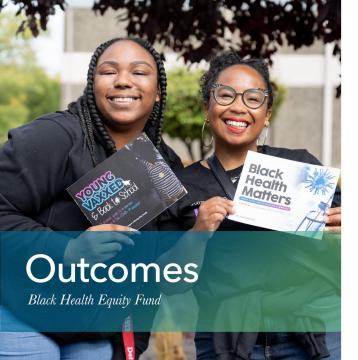

Purpose Directory



To provide **direct resources** to disrupt social determinants of health of Black, African, and African American peoples that are at the root of health inequities delivered through whole person care, community system building, and policy development



- Strengthen community partnerships among Black and minority focused organizations, anti-racism initiatives, and generational change through public health and development programs to reduce the impact of systemic oppressive structures.
- Public policy development that promotes health equity for Black and minority communities by removing systemic oppressive barriers that produce economic and health disparities to ensure healthy communities for all.
- End the cycle of a lifetime of health disparities among Black and minority populations by focusing on youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility.



- Create a new community-based coalitions (e.g. Black Health Equity Coalition) focused on development and providing culturally appropriate programming for vulnerable populations, beginning with Black communities.
- Develop partnerships with youth development organizations focused on Black communities and providing academic financial assisitance for early education, childcare, youth, healthy living, and social responsibility actions.
- Design and produce services addressing the intersectionality of social determinants of health and whole person health for Black community members.
